

Maybe it's because I was born in the month of September, but the start of fall has always caused me to exhale. My body seems to settle and sing, as if to say, "Yes, you are home here."

I belong here in the beginning of changing colors and the invitation to wear colors that complement my earthy skin tone. I've always loved how the pressing heat of Alabama humidity gives way to a cozy warmth in the day and crisp nights under twinkling stars. Songs seem easy to sing in those moments of contentedness and belonging.

Yet, this season has arrived with an unexpectedness that hasn't stirred those same feelings within me. After spending the last six years in the temperate, and often arctic, weather of Iceland, my family has transitioned to the States for an extended period of time. Although it was hard to leave, I imagined that my arrival would be easier. But each week here seems to point to a realization that I still can't quite comprehend.

It doesn't feel quite like home anymore. I gaze at the same multihued trees, the same roads, eating familiar food in the same city, but it's not the same because, in the process of being away, I've changed. MEET

Barb Roose

What does your current season look like?

Great question! My current season looks like a visit to a cute local coffee shop in the middle of the quiet afternoon.

I like to visit coffee shops to catch up on work, sip a hot cup of tea, and look out the window while I catch up on my emails and often myself. It's been a robust two years of writing books, lots of travel, and a myriad of personal challenges and now it's time for a pause. I'm on a break from writing books and from taking on any new obligations in my life. While I'll keep working, it's also time to check in with myself, and see what shifts or pivots I need to make in managing myself and my career.

What are some challenges you have faced in your career? How did God meet you?

My life fell apart as my publishing career began. I'd never planned to have a publishing career, so it was a giant leap of faith once I felt God prompting me to leave my fulltime secure job at my church in October 2015 to step into the unknown journey of self-employment as a Christian speaker and author. My then-spouse left our family for almost six months in that same season. I never doubted God's prompting to leave my beloved job, but that season of uncertainty and loss was painful.

Over the next three years, I wrote and released four traditionally published books and Bible studies.

I also endured an addiction crisis in my home, the deaths of my father and father-in-law, and another marriage separation before the death of my 26-year marriage in 2019. Much of that season was just getting through one day at a time. As people around me would talk about their hopes and dreams for the future, I couldn't even begin to fathom the future. I clung to God each day like I had no other source of air or strength. The gift of that season was learning that when it seemed as if I'd lost it all, God was truly enough.

What inspired you to write your latest book, Stronger Than Stress?



I wrote *Stronger Than Stress*: 10 Spiritual Practices to Win the Battle of Overwhelm because Jesus had to save me from my toxic habit of trying to do it all! Can anyone relate? I'd regularly take on too much to do, never give myself enough time to do it, and I often tried to be everything to everybody. I was stuck in a non-stop stress cycle, and it took circumstances beyond my control for me to learn how to stop setting myself up for overwhelm and burnout.

The a-ha moment came for me during a women's leadership development small group at my church over twenty years ago. I read Richard Foster's Celebration of Discipline for the first time. Even though I grew up in the church, I never learned about spiritual practices and how they equipped me to walk in the way of Jesus and experience the peace of Jesus. Since Foster's book is over thirty years old and not specifically written for today's Christian woman, I wrote *Stronger Than Stress* to teach godly spiritual practices to women that create a path to Jesus' peace in our stressful and overwhelming lives.

Why is this such a vital message, no matter your age, stage, or season?

If we believe the data, then large numbers of women are dealing with daily overwhelm. Wouldn't it be wonderful to teach ourselves AND the next generation how to avoid overwhelm by modeling how to surrender, take a day of rest each week, live in a healthy community with other Christian women, and submit to the leading to God's Holy Spirit? We can always use these spiritual practices no matter our age, stage or season of life.

As an author, speaker, and now literary agent, you interact with so many people. Is there something consistent you see God doing in their lives?

God is always showing us His grace. If God treated us as we deserve, we would not be here today. God's grace, which is His undeserved kindness, lavishes every moment of each day of our lives. As someone who interacts with many people, one of my favorite observations of God's grace is the opportunity to share what we've been through after we go through it. God has given us the ability to be transformed and to heal from life's heartache and heartbreak. That beautiful gift of grace can be shared for the blessing and benefit of others – and that's really cool to see.

What is the best way for a potential author to prepare themselves if they are interested in stepping into the traditional publishing space?

Be patient, prepare, and be patient. That's the big picture. On a more practical level, head to a writer's conference. Yes, it's an upfront investment, but it will save you months and years of going in the wrong direction, wasting your time trying to figure things out on your own. Almost no one accidentally stumbles into traditional publishing without any help or guidance. I suggest attending one writer's conference each year, where publishing editors and literary agents will be on-site. These are the people that you need to advance in your journey toward the goal of traditional publishing.

What does the perfect day for you look like?

My perfect days are quiet, with nothing on my schedule and absolutely no thoughts working through my brain. Oh, and Chipotle.

How can we pray for you?

Thank you for asking! I covet prayers – yes! My daily goal is to live out Luke 16:10, where Jesus teaches us to be faithful in the small things. While my daily spiritual care and physical self-care habits aren't small things, these are the building blocks that support God's assignment for me. Please pray that I remain faithful to those small daily habits that keep my eyes on Jesus and fully trust wherever God leads me.





WHAT'S IN A NAME? SOMETIMES EVERYTHING GUEST ARTICLE

It was the flicker in his eyes that told me I was busted.

It was a left turn at a stop sign that I had taken too fast and a split second decision to glide through instead of obeying the rules of the road. Behind the bushes sat a black unmarked truck. The driver and I made eye contact, and recognition immediately flooded my senses. I had pulled over before he even threw on his lights because I knew I had been caught breaking the law by the law incarnate.

Emotion like an ocean wave moved from my belly to my head, filling my ears with its rush. I had three kids in the backseat who had many questions about why we had stopped the car so soon into our drive. All I can remember thinking was how I needed to model submission to the personified authority of the law that was now sauntering toward my driver's side window.

He took my license and registration, and my eyes glanced over his badge with his surname. Jolly. He's not so jolly, said my distant inner voice as he lectured me. I caught the words "failure to stop" and "unsafe". So intent on my goal of being a model citizen to my kids, I didn't utter a word of protest in my defense.

Dangerous driver.

He glanced into the back seat and saw three fidgety kids with curious eyes. "You really need to slow down with kids in the car."

Unsafe mother.

After taking my license to his vehicle, he returned with a ticket. I was now a little breathless from my galloping heart and the mental restraint of keeping my self-righteous indignation at bay, all the while trying to answer the children's questions with fairness. He paused before letting me go. "I'm going to have a look to see that the car seats are properly installed."

Negligent parent.

Now my face was red, and not from the summer heat.

After seeing the seats had in fact been correctly installed, he gave me permission to leave the scene of my crime, eyes burning with unshed tears, more than annoyed that a few dropped without my consent already. As I drove my children to summer camp, the ordeal swirled around in my head on a carousel.

Dangerous driver. Unsafe mother. Negligent parent.

Guilty.

I held onto my shame for weeks, marinating in condemnation. It was a dear cousin who shattered its hold as I spilled my story and tears out to her as we waded in the lake together on a family beach day.

"You know why you're so upset, right? He was criticizing more than just your driving."

Not until that moment had I realized the names I had internalized from my brief brush with the law. I am hardly the first person to get pulled over by a police officer, but it wasn't the infraction or ticket or demerits that offended me: It was the officer's judgment of my character.

He didn't use words to give me these labels—words are not always necessary. There are oceans of meaning behind a question, or posture, or scowl.

People are very good at lying—it's in our nature. And sometimes we can fool even ourselves into believing the lies our own perceptions, or the judgements of others, invent. But as Christians, we do not need to live in that false reality: "But that is not the way you learned Christ! — assuming that you have heard about him and were taught in him, as the truth is in Jesus, to put off your old self, which belongs to your former manner of life and is corrupt through deceitful desires, and to be renewed in the spirit of your minds, and to put on the new self, created after the likeness of God in true righteousness and holiness." (Ephesians 4:20-24 ESV)

I am a careful parent and my mistakes do not define my worth: "My flesh and my heart may fail, but God is the strength of my heart and my portion forever." Psalm 73:26 NIV

Our flesh is corrupt and will lean into deceit. As believers in Christ, we have the beautiful ability given by the Spirit to renew our minds, washing it afresh in the truth of God's word. Lies need to be exposed and cleared away because only then can that empty space be filled with truth.

I am a good driver and I sometimes make the wrong choice: "<u>Surely there is not a righteous man on earth who does</u> <u>good and never sins.</u>" (Ecclesiastes 7:20)

I am a safe mother and I make mistakes: "Whoever conceals his transgressions will not prosper, but he who confesses and forsakes them will obtain mercy." (Proverbs 28:13)

I am a careful parent and my mistakes do not define my worth: "My flesh and my heart may fail, but God is the strength of my heart and my portion forever." (Psalm 73:26)

Our new self, created in God's likeness and righteousness, can take responsibility for our wrongdoing, confess our sin, then live in the freedom of "no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus" (Romans 8:1).

Have you been leaning into a lie? Whether it's a label from another or a shame you've constructed, it's holding you back from your inheritance of freedom in Christ. Bring the lie into the light of truth and feel relief as God releases its grip on your life.

We live in the newness—and truth—of Christ alone.


